Triduum Sacrum

For a seasonal Church like the Episcopal Church, Lent is a spiritually and emotionally loaded time. This sense of the season is very concentrated in the last week of the season, Holy Week, and the service which concludes its observance.

That service, known as Triduum encompasses the observance of Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday. This year at St. Michael's we are going to move that celebration to a more conscious level.

The way we plan to accomplish this is to publish the service for the three great days in one booklet, to be used as the days go by. This approach is consistent with the overall understanding of Triduum, because a close inspection of the Prayer Book shows that once the service begins on Maundy Thursday, it does not end until the dismissal at the conclusion of Great Easter Vigil.

Here is the schedule:

- Maundy Thursday –A 7 PM proper liturgy for Maundy Thursday. This particular service focuses on the institution of the Last Supper and the commandment of Jesus to serve each other through a ritual foot washing that takes place in the service. There will be congregational hymns and the clearing of celebratory decorations from the church.
- Good Friday — Noon. The proper liturgy for Good Friday will begin in the church in silence with the tolling of the noonday bells. This service includes the passion reading from John and communion from the reserved host. There is no celebration of the Eucharist from Maundy Thursday until the Great Easter Vigil. The St. Michael's Choristers will be our music leaders. The church will remain open for silent prayer and medita-

Message From The Sr. Warden

David, Garry and I have a Rector/Warden meeting every month to discuss the upcoming vestry meeting and issues in general. It is a productive time for us to share opinions, concerns, good news, and take joy in the treasures of St. Michaels. One of our discussions this past month revolved around growing our younger family and youth participation. We talked about how life has changed so much for families of today. Most of us over 50 years old remember that it was frowned upon to do business on Sundays. I was raised in Michigan and Sundays were devoted to Church first then we were fed.

We were fed spiritually at Mass (yes, I was raised Roman Catholic) which Mom usually selected to attend the late morning service. That meant no food because we fasted in those days before going to communion.

Then we were fed physically with brunch which consisted of a rather large midday meal. Believe me, as a child I was really grateful for that after the long spiritual fast!

We did not shop because stores were pretty much closed until the movements to shop and have entertainment open in the early 1960's. Dad was strict – no jeans or sloppy clothes on Sunday. Sunday dinner was a staple. We all gathered for a late afternoon family dinner in the dining room – no kitchen table that day. My married siblings came home to join us if they lived in the area. Sunday was a family day. Schools did not have activities, we did not take off every weekend and ski (unless you had money), the community was quiet and, well, you get the idea.

Today, family life has changed so very much. It is not enough for children to partipate in a few extra-curricular activities. It is part of daily life that home is really a place to sleep and eat and where you hang your

tion until 3 PM, the hour noted as that of Christ's death. At that time the doors will be closed until the next morning.

- Holy Saturday — 9 AM. A short service of readings will take place in the church. This is the one day of the year, where communion is prohibited specifically.
- The Great Easter Vigil—8 PM beginning with the lighting of the Paschal Candle from a fire at the doors of the church. This is the most important service of the Christian year for any congregation, although the celebrations on Easter Morning are important for visitors and occasional worshippers. This service calls to mind in readings and baptismal renewal the history of salvation and our part in that history.

This custom of following Jesus' last three days before Easter was a practice developed in the Jerusalem area, on behalf of Pilgrim's, during the fourth century A.D. The continuing practice of Holy Week is a powerful reminder of the humanity and suffering of Jesus. In this day and age, to be reminded that he did not go from triumph to triumph, but passed through human suffering is an important aspect of the character of Jesus and a reminder of humility for all Christians. In lieu of this remembrance, it is all too easy to fall into triumphalism, thinking somehow Jesus moved from triumphal entry to triumphant resurrection without any messiness in between.

Here is my encouragement for this year. If you are in Bristol, join us for all three days and try to see if you can hold them as one continuous service. If you are by necessity in other places at these times, find a local church where you can join in the remembrance. Christians all over the world will be honoring this memory by taking part in the services, and that practice joins us all together in a worldwide communion.

A father was approached by his small son who told him proudly, "I know what the Bible means!" His father smiled and replied, "What do you mean, you 'know' what the Bible means? The son replied, "I do know!" "Okay," said his father. "What does the Bible mean?" "That's easy, Daddy..." the young boy replied excitedly, "It stands for 'Basic Information Before Leaving Earth.'"

It's been many years since an Easter hat has graced a female head on Easter Sunday. However, during the days of my youth, it was unheard of to pass through the portals of St. Michael's Church or any other church on Easter Sunday or any other Sunday without some type of covering on ones head.

The weeks before Easter our heads were filled with thoughts of Easter bonnets, chocolate bunnies and, in my case, a bus trip with Aunt Jen Manchester to downtown Providence. I would claim no relationship to this dear soul whatsoever other than the fact that we were members of the Congregational Church. My mother suffered from nervous maladies and was unable to leave the house so was delighted to put me in the capable hands of Aunt Jen, the Mary Poppins of her day.

Those were the days when downtown Providence streets were lined with department stores, Gladdings, where a uniformed attendant operated the elevator, The Boston Store and Shepards, where the floors creaked like an old woman's bones, were on Wetminister Street. Crossing over, we passed Grace Church and made our way to Weybosset Street and the Outlet Co., that surpassed them all in size and where at Christmas time, animated figures danced and twirled in the windows and where the real Santa held court on the second floor.

Aunt Jen never tired of my questions. Her voice was as soft as cotton balls as she and I experienced what to a young child was a great adventure, and, as you see, I have never forgotten. We climbed a tall wooden staircase to a cafeteria. Years later when I attempted to find it, it had vanished. Perhaps it was a figment of my imagination? I do have a vivid one but nothing could surpass the creamy whipped potato and the meatloaf topped with rich velvety gravy, nor the homemade apple and lemon meringue pies.

It would be dark when we boarded the bus that would take us over the Washington Bridge and through the tiny towns of Riverside, Barrington and Warren, dropping off sleepy passengers along the way. Aunt Jen and I got off at the end of the line, Bristol, I, carrying my Easter bonnet and perhaps a chocolate bunny or two.

Easter morning Aunt Jen and I sat upon velvet cushions in a pew at the Congregational Church. The sweet odor of lilies permeated the air like women's perfume. I felt like Shirley Temple with my Easter bonnet over my normally straight hair that had spent the night wearing rag curlers that would guarantee me to look like Shirley Temple, at least until the damp air from Bristol Harbor passed through our town in early afternoon.

This Easter will find me sitting on wooden pews in a church here in Jupiter. I imagine there will be the sweet smell of Easter lilies. I doubt very much if there will be an abundance of Easter bonnets. The message will be the same "Jesus Christ is risen today. Alleluia!" We have much to be thankful for, especially now, when so many in Japan have lost their homes, their loved ones and are faced with the unknown.

Last April, I was in a hospital room when a doctor said something to me that will stay with me forever. He told me that it was likely that I had saved a life that day. A pretty powerful statement and I think God had at least a hand in this, but I share this with you in the hope that others will share my experience.

Last March, I was identified as a match for a 10 year old leukemia patient who needed a bone marrow transplant. After further tests, the green light was given for the bone marrow harvest for April 22nd. Since then, all reports have been positive for the patient whom I have not met yet. In October, I was told that his progress was spectacular.

The reason that I share this with you is to perhaps inspire others to help. In conjunction with a blood drive on April 10th in the Parish House, there will also be a bone marrow drive for 5 year old Katelyn Bailey. Katelyn, who lives in Middletown, is fighting cancer for the second time in her life. The Rhode Island Blood Center and The National Marrow Donor Program has not found the match that Katelyn needs. That match could be here in our community.

As I write this, I must confess that our family has a Sunday routine, between Sunday School, Church Service and a few treats at coffee time, we always find a reason to not cross the street for whatever event may be at the Parish House. We would be hard pressed to turn away from this. If you find that you are like my family, I ask you to make an exception on April 10th. Go before church services, or go after...but please go and get on the Bone Marrow Registry. You would be giving Katelyn and her family the hope that they need. You just may be THE match!

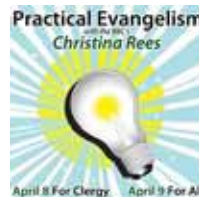
April Meeting Cancelled.
