Work of the People

Here at the beginning of August, I am certain most rectors and congregation members are still thinking about summer. It might seem untimely, then, to bring up the subject of *the work of the people*. But, that work occurs all throughout the year and in anticipating the needs we will have as the Fall progresses, I want to talk about filling the roles of the people in worship.

One event which occurred at the beginning of July really focused my attention on this issue. That event was the Celebration of Jini McCaw's life on July 2. Jini was a longtime parishioner of St. Michael's and was instrumental in carrying out so many ministries of this church. One of those ministries of which she was a vital part was that of Eucharistic Minister.

Jini, along with some ten or so colleagues, embarked on the journey of keeping those who are no longer able to come to church, or those who are temporarily inhibited from coming, connected to our community by taking communion to them. After some training around pastoral boundaries and the theology of their work, these lay men and women worked to assist the Rector and the congregation by providing this vital ministry. They did so for many years. Now, however, their ranks have been depleted and they need to be renewed.

That ministry is now called Lay Eucharistic Visitation, and its ministers are Lay Eucharistic Visitors. But it is the same ministry. These folks do not replace the priest. They do, however, become extensions of our Eucharistic celebration as well as extensions of our congregation. Their work and presence are holy things. Yes, they are holy things primarily because they deal with the holy

Call for Ushers

Ushering is a vital and distinctive ministry of our church. Ushers do more than seat worshippers, bring the offerings to the altar, and manage the flow of traffic during Communion. Along with our greeters, the ushers welcome worshippers as they enter the church and deliver the Sunday bulletin which is our order of service. As usher you help to seat those who seem hesitant about where to sit, assist those who may need an arm to lean on, and guide those to available seating when the church is full. They are also among the first people called upon to help if worshippers have questions or if problems arise during the service (such as when someone needs direction to a rest room or when a medical emergency arises). After service, the ushers ensure that the bulletins have been collected from the pews and that the pews are in order. Ushers are assigned to their preferred time of service and generally volunteer once a quarter. We are in need of additional volunteers to fill this important role for both the 8 a.m. and 10 a.m. services. Please consider this opportunity for participation. Sponsor-a-Chorister Program Kicks Off Info Session on Sun, Aug 14 after 10 a.m. Eucharist

Starting this fall, the St. Michael's Choristers will be singing weekly at the 10 a.m. Sunday liturgy. The Choristers will also begin receiving small stipends for their commitment and effort. Stipends have been given to child choristers in England for hundreds of years, and they are one of the hallmarks of large, thriving programs in the United States and abroad.

In order to provide these small monthly stipends, we will begin a "Sponsor-a-Chorister" program, in which members of the church can "adopt" a singer. Choristers will receive a small amount of money for each rehearsal and service, and that amount will increase as they move up in the *Voice for Life* curriculum. The Sponsor-a-Chorister program is a great way for parishioners to be directly involved in the lives of our young singers.

Come learn more about this exciting new program in our parish life at St. Michael's. We will hold a special information session on Sunday, August 14th after the 10 a.m. Eucharist in the Serviceman's Chapel during coffee hour.

Now Recruiting Singers for All Choirs

If you or someone you know loves to sing, you are invited to sing in one of our choirs at St. Michael's. No matter your age, we have choir for you!

- The St. Michael's Angel Choir (ages 4-7) is an exciting preparatory music program that combines music, movement, and play to teach fundamental music making skills that prepare our young ones for a lifetime of successful music making. Rehearsals are held on Friday afternoons from 3:45 to 4:15 and conclude with a light snack (beginning after Labor Day).


- The St. Michael's Choristers (ages 8-16) is a Royal School of Church Music in the centuries-old tradition of the cathedral choir schools of England. The program provides a first-rate music education for free to anyone interested, regardless of religious affiliation. The Choristers rehearse weekly on Friday afternoons from 4:30 to 6:30 (starting after Labor Day). Beginning in September, they will vest weekly along with the Parish Choir at all 10 a.m. Eucharists and receive a small monthly stipend!

- The St. Michael's Parish Choir (ages 17+) is a wonderful way to use your talents and skills as a musician to the service of the Church and the glory of God. We rehearse weekly on Wednesday evenings from 7 to 9 p.m. and vest each week at the 10 a.m. Eucharist from September to June. The Parish Choir also sings three Evensongs annually. Prior training and the ability to read music is not required but is helpful and desired.

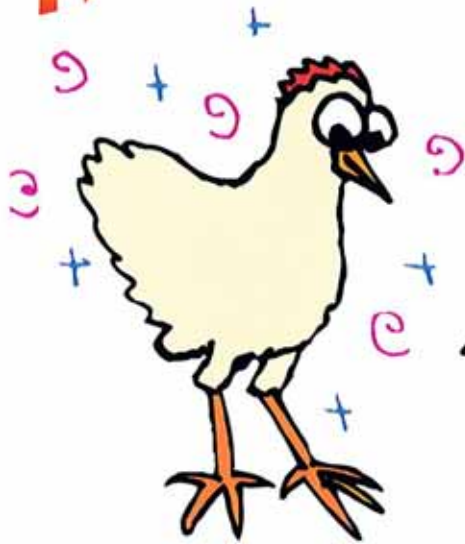

Painting Holmes House



One of our Capital Campaign projects is to paint Holmes House. A quick glance will tell you that this is a priority project. Painting Holmes House is more than a little scraping and a couple coats of paint. There is a lot of fine detail work in the trim and much repair work to be done as part of the project. We've been fortunate to secure the services of Samuel's Painting for this work. Before any paint can go on the building we need to tell Trevor what color to use, and that is where you come in.

A vestry appointed committee has been working to help make the color choice easy and fun. The committee consisted of Lit Jones, Louisa Jones, Leta Cain, Cathi Esselen, and Cathy Holmstrom. Over 70 photos of neighborhood houses were

A View from the South Side of Holmes House collected and a computer model of Holmes House was developed. The committee worked to narrow the field of choices taking into consideration the surrounding buildings, including Hair, Heart and Soul on the north side of Holmes House. They wanted the final options to have variety, with the choices suitable to the character of the neighborhood and Holmes House itself. Since this is a historic neighborhood and a federal style building which serves as the church offices, the final candidates are traditional palettes, several with red doors.

There are seven color schemes from which to choose. Each of them are taken from an "inspiration house". Six are in the neighborhood and one is from research done in 1988 by Lombard John Pozzi, a restoration architect hired by Canon Daniel and the Vestry. The research in 1988 revealed that at one time the house was a grey green with wine colored trim elements. The first of our neighborhood inspirations is the rectory in a soft yellow, brilliant white and classic black; a modern take on the grand dame of federal color schemes. The northern most neighborhood inspiration is 620 Hope Street in a soft gray with dark green and

Navajo white trim. Our southern most inspiration house is a more contemporary home at 30 Walley Street. This is a handsome palette, in a rich honey brown, with cream and chocolate trim and a teal green door. Rounding out the choices are three houses on High Street. 68 High Street is another characteristically Federal presentation in a light green with cream and red trim. 142 High Street is actually a Victorian style home but like the contemporary, the colors work well on Holmes House. From this house the taupe body is complemented by plum and cream with a red door. Completing the list of candidates is the lovely cottage at 90 High Street. This house is a delicate vanilla cream with a lighter cream and deep green trim with a reddish-brown door.

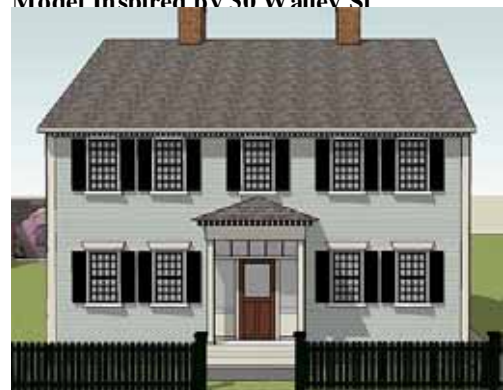
Color can be a tricky thing. It changes depending on lighting, setting, and pictures are not always accurate. So the committee is offering several ways for you to imagine how Holmes House will look when all the work is complete. As part of the project, the committee used a website to compare the neighborhood pictures and ultimately three views of the computer models. This is a very helpful tool. Of course you have the pictures here, but please visit the website where you can see the three views of the candidate models and pictures of the inspiration houses. The website is http://picasaweb.google.com/1jones.bristol/Smc_holmes_ballot#.

You will be receiving a mailing that explains the voting process and has pictures of each of the candidate models and inspiration houses. An information board is available at the back of the church for 4 weeks during voting. There will be an opportunity to walk through the Close and view the colors in outdoor light as we make the final selection.

The whole membership can participate in the voting. The vestry wants everyone to have a say in the color choice for Holmes House. With that in mind, a voting method has been designed to allow for changes in preferences, so vote strategically. You will have more than one vote, and more than one opportunity to vote. The voting takes place over 4 weeks. As the weeks progress, candidates garner votes and leaders emerge. Each member will have 20 votes to use during the 4 weeks of campaign. You can place all of your votes up-



Model Inspired by 30 Walley St



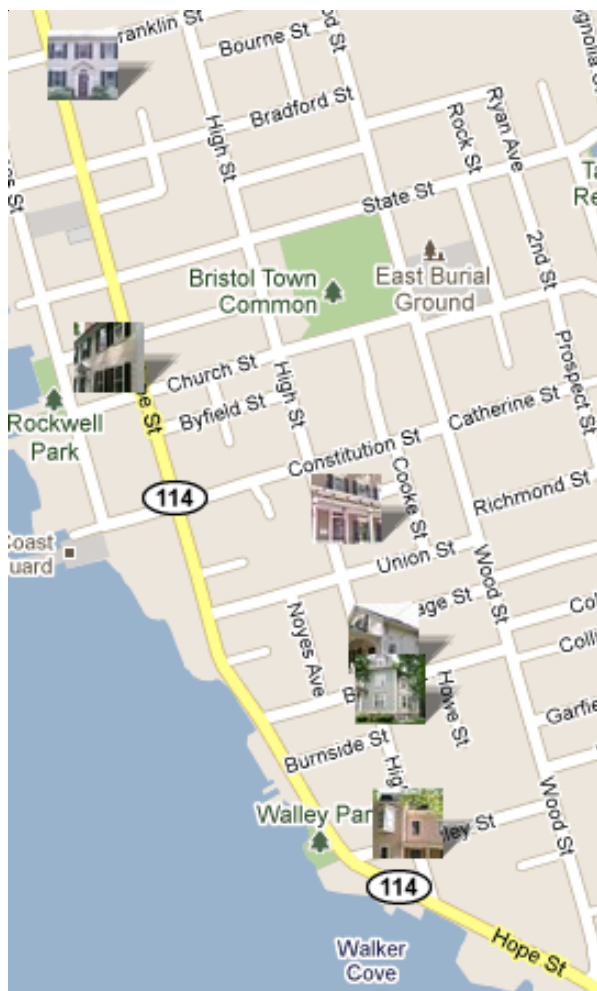
Model Inspired by 142 High Street

front, spread them over 4 weeks, or save them all for the last week. Vote totals will be posted weekly on the information boards and the website. Official paper ballots have been mailed to every member's address along with a letter explaining the process. You can mail in the ballots or bring them to church to be counted. Voting began Sunday, July 24 with the unveiling of the candidates between the services. At the end, on Sunday August 21 there will be a wine and cheese party in the Close. At this event, participants will have an additional 5 votes. There will be sample paint on clapboards, milling about, good food and fine fellowship. Tallies will be updated in real time as participants cast votes, and at the end of the evening, the candidate with the most votes wins.

Take a walk on the campaign trail. In addition to the information sheets, display boards and website, there is also a campaign trail map. To give you some time to consider your options and see the inspiration houses in their actual settings, take a walk or drive through Bristol's downtown. Less than a mile separates the northern and southern most inspiration houses. If you start at



St. Michaels, head north, then south, and return to St. Michaels, the walk is 1.87 mi and can be done at a leisurely pace in about 45 minutes. Choosing a color for Holmes House can be a metaphor for our future. We want Holmes House to have a Presence in the neighborhood. The campus is a welcoming sanctuary for all her members and visitors. By giving the old girl a facelift, we prepare to face our future. By having a say in the color, you participate in that future. While you take your walk around downtown, imagine what might be in that future. How can we bring more of God's fellowship to our neighbors? You can use your voice to influence St. Michael's place in Bristol and the world.

We are here to answer your questions. If you have questions about the process, or how the candidates were chosen, or anything else, someone will be on-hand to answer them after each of the Sunday morning services. This is a big decision that will be with us for a while, but it should also be a joyful event as we imagine what our future can bring. 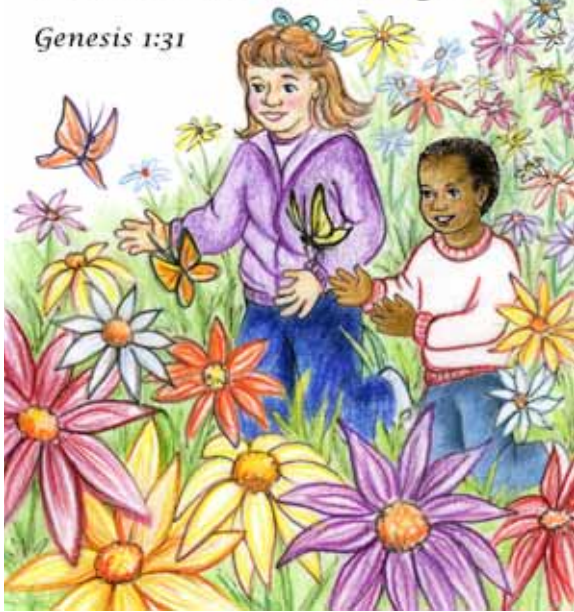

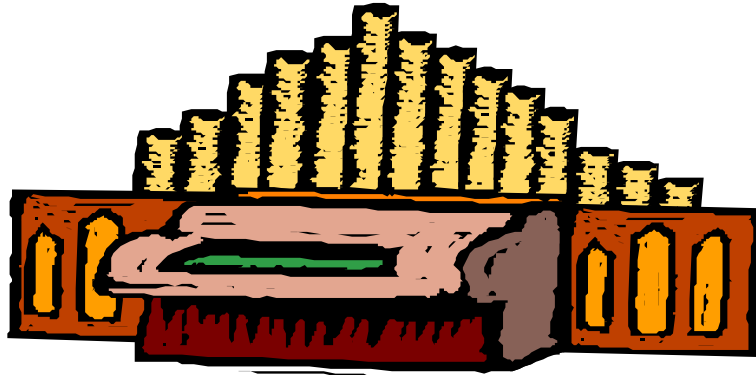
