Evensong and the Anglican Tradition:

*How the Royal School of Church Music and
the St. Michael's Choir Enrich Us*

This coming Sunday evening, October 2, we will complete our weeklong celebration of the parish of St. Michael's, with a choral evensong in the church at 5 PM. There are a number of auspicious signs that coincide with the celebration. Among them is the recognition of our parish life through our chicken barbecue, combined with a Eucharistic celebration of the feast of St. Michael and all Angels, and the gathering of our choristers and choir to lead us in an Anglican specialty, Evensong.

I think it has been a happy confluence of events that the chicken barbecue was moved back to the last week of September. That movement has allowed us to include our patronal feast as a part of the overall recognition of life at St. Michael's church, while participating in the beginnings of the program year. So, we bring together in focus celebration through feasting, liturgy, and music, reminding us why we are community of faith.

Moving into this period of the year, it is important to highlight how our music program draws our attention to and inspires the actions of our common life together. From the first Sunday that they meet in September, to the annual choir retreat, to the choral evensong that brackets this celebration week at St. Michael's, the choir enriches our life, elevates our worship, and leads us into deeper spirituality.

When I arrived two years ago, it certainly was important that we had the St. Michael's choir and the leadership of Waylon Whitley, our choir director and organist. I was impressed by the quality of the music which they offered. During that first year, the choir helped us to de-

Message From the Senior Warden

I say this every September, but it really is hard to believe that Fall is just around the corner. With the change our lives get back into the routine of work or school and we leave the care-free summertime behind for one more year.

This summer your vestry has not taken time off, we have worked every month to continue our oversight of the parish. One issue that has been under discussion and development is the use of our facilities. St. Michaels is blessed to be able to offer the use of our buildings for community activities such as Al Alon, girl scouts, and chorus groups. In addition, we have ministry work that is being conducted in our buildings such as weekly yoga and sometimes the book club. The vestry recognizes that oversight to effectively manage the use of the facilities is now becoming more important since we no longer have a sexton. There are details to consider, such as opening and closing buildings, lights, clean-up, and set-up such as chairs and tables. These are not small details and they do not get done without volunteers.

Acknowledging this planning, the vestry is in the process of developing a usage procedure for anyone wishing to hold events in our buildings. We want the vestry to be aware of all events because of our responsibility to maintain and oversee the buildings. We are developing a usage request form that will be completed when a request is called into the office to use a room or building. Part of that information will include who is going to come open/close the building and see to the oversight of the use of the room. We expect to have this completed this month.

To help with oversight, we will develop a "go to" team of volunteers who will share the schedule of events. By

velop the ability to chant the Psalms, a significant addition to Eucharistic worship, they expanded their repertoire of anthems, and they supported our congregational hymnody. I know that our time together each Sunday would be less meaningful without their ministry.

During our second year together, again, with the leadership of Waylon Whitley, we added a new component to our musical ministries, the Royal School of Church Music (RSCM). At that time we had 15 young men and women show up to show interest in the program. Nine stayed. Last year we added three more choristers, for a total of 12. This year we're working with 11 young men and women. They are devoted, hard-working, and talented. Over these past three years they have learned about Psalmody, hymnody, music theory, vocal capabilities, and worship in the church. This is a formation program that not only provides us with inspiring music, it also helps these young men and women learn a faith. Wherever they go for the rest of their lives, they will know that music will enrich their lives, that Anglican theology can be the foundation of a life with God, and that their gifts have purpose and meaning in service to others.

I am praying, as I did last year, for a gloriously sunny day next Sunday evening. That way we will be blessed by the reminders of our St. Michael's name's sake: the readings, the collects, the musical offerings, the deep silences, and the glorious vision of the sun pouring through our St. Michael's window. Come join us for this special part of Anglican spirituality, come join us to support our choirs, come join us to recognize how this church supports us in worship, ministry, and formation for our lives in Christ.

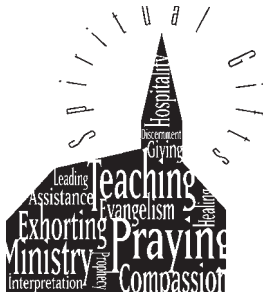


Mark your calendars for Oct. 29!

Amazon.com review of **Glass Castle**:

Jeannette Walls grew up with parents whose ideals and stubborn nonconformity were both their curse and their salvation. Rex and Rose Mary Walls had four children. In the beginning, they lived like nomads, moving among Southwest desert towns, camping in the mountains. Rex was a charismatic, brilliant man who, when sober, captured his children's imagination, teaching them physics, geology, and above all, how to embrace life fearlessly. Rose Mary, who painted and wrote and couldn't stand the responsibility of providing for her family, called herself an "excitement addict." Cooking a meal that would be consumed in fifteen minutes had no appeal when she could make a painting that might last forever.

Later, when the money ran out, or the romance of the wandering life faded, the Walls retreated to the dismal West Virginia mining town — and the family — Rex Walls had done everything he could to escape. He drank. He stole the grocery money and disappeared for days. As the dysfunction of the family escalated, Jeannette and her brother and sisters had to fend for themselves, supporting one another as they weathered their parents' betrayals and, finally, found the resources and will to leave home.

What is so astonishing about Jeannette Walls is not just that she had the guts and tenacity and intelligence to get out, but that she describes her parents with such deep affection and generosity. Hers is a story of triumph against all odds, but also a tender, moving tale of unconditional love in a family that despite its profound flaws gave her the fiery determination to carve out a successful life on her own terms.

For two decades, Jeannette Walls hid her roots. Now she tells her own story. A regular contributor to MSNBC.com, she lives in New York and Long Island and is married to the writer John Taylor.

About Faith Walk for Charity

What do Jews, Muslims, and all manner of Christians have in common? They all think it's a good idea to help people in need. Faith Walk for Charity exists in order to accentuate this common value. Every year, the walk draws together people from a wide diversity of religious traditions to do something good together—to help a chosen group of neighbors in need. An advisory board (consisting of clergy and lay people from a wide variety of faith groups) meets once annually to select a secular, charitable cause.

Since 2006 Faith Walk for Charity has drawn together several hundred Rhode Islanders from a wide variety of religious traditions to walk one mile together and/or make a financial contribution. The walk has been led by clergy from Jewish, Muslim, Catholic, Muslim, Baptist, and Episcopal faiths, and over \$110,000 has been raised. 100% of donations are given to the chosen beneficiary. Past beneficiaries include Crossroads-RI (2006), the RI Community Food Bank (2007), The RI Coalition Against Domestic Violence (2008), Amos House (2009), and the RI Free Clinic (2010). This year the cause is healthcare and wellness children with diabetes, and all donations will be given to Camp Surefire.

About Camp Surefire

Summer camp can be a life-changing experience for children – a time to explore, test boundaries and build relationships with people they may never encounter in daily life. If you're a child living with diabetes, however, the options for summer camp are very few and often very expensive. For families struggling to provide the basics, the prospect of summer camp may feel out of reach. Camp Surefire and become confident as they face the challenge of growing up with diabetes.

In Rhode Island, only one camp exists specifically for children and teens with diabetes: Camp Surefire. Founded in 1998, Camp Surefire offers a full staff of doctors, nurses, counselors and nutritionists to ensure that campers are safe while they're having fun just being kids-forming friendships, learning from peers and counselors and discovering newfound independence.
